**Course Description:** ARH 102 History of Art II Renaissance through Modern, is a continuation of ARH101. It is a broad and inclusive survey of the art, architecture and material cultures of western civilization from the Renaissance through modern times, incorporating a global perspective. Topics including historically significant art, architecture and material culture and the relationship between the social function of art and its form and content are introduced and examined through an interdisciplinary lens.

## **Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):**

### After completion of the course students will be able to

- 1. Identify key points / historical information about art, architecture and cultures.
- 2. Given an image to identify students will be able to list the time period, culture, and / or geographical regions, stylistic tendencies and significance.
- 3. Define and appropriately utilize art terminology in answering quiz questions, and in their written research paper.
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of art historical methodology by applying theoretical analysis to artworks discussed in papers, journals and guizzes as appropriate.

**Course Structure:** Course material will be presented through a combination of readings, lectures, and videos. If possible to arrange there may also be a field trip to see artwork in situ.
