Course Description

This course will provide a survey of the symptoms and syndromes of abnormal behavior, with an emphasis on a scientific, empirical view as well as insight into the subjective experience of mental illness and disorders. The primary focus is the description of various symptoms and diagnosis of illness, but research and theories concerning etiology and treatment also will be briefly covered. At the end of this course, students will be able to describe the symptoms and diagnosis of specific mental illnesses.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of fundamental theoretical perspectives, principles, concepts, vocabulary and methodology of the study of abnormal psychology.
- 2. Compare and contrast the major theoretical perspectives found in abnormal psychology.
- 3. Compare and contrast different classifications of psychological disorders and how culture and social changes influence individual's perceptions of these disorders.
- 4. Critically analyze information pertaining to abnormal psychology found in film, television, radio, print, and IT sources.
- 5. Describe the relevance of religion, race, class, gender, age, and ethnicity to understanding differences in the prevalence of disorders and the diagnosis, prognosis, and treatment of these disorders.

Course Structure

This course will include weekly readings, lectures, discussion posts, one writing assignment, and two exams (midterm and final; multiple choice).

Discussion Posts (10 in total x 5 points each= 50 points)

You will be given a discussion prompt for a particular week and be expected to respond using information from your notes, lectures, textbook, and personal experience. In order to get full points you will also be expected to respond to at least **1 other classmate's post**. Generally, a Discussion Post that gets full points is 3-5 sentences long and clearly answers the question.

Case Studies—Writing Assignment (50 points)

These case studies will provide case details about a particular person exhibiting certain symptoms. Following these descriptions, there will be several prompts asking about topics ranging from diagnosis, treatment, and/or prognosis and other facets of particular disorder/s. You may use your notes, lectures, the textbook, and external sources to formulate your answer. You will have 3 options to choose from and you only need to **complete 1**.

Length: 300-500 words

Exams (25 points each x 2=50 points)

You will have two exams: a midterm and final. They will each be worth 25 points

I will have several recorded lectures. They were made the last time I taught this course so some of the logistical comments and due dates I may reference probably will not apply but the actual content is still relevant. Email if there is any confusion.
