Course Description

Principles and practices of writing. Includes writing college-level essays, review of basic writing skills, and written works. Also includes narrative/descriptive, expository, and persuasive writing. May be offered in modules.

Student Learning Outcomes

After completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop ideas about a topic for the purpose of writing, organizing, selecting, and relating ideas, and develop them in coherent paragraphs and essays.
- 2. Use a variety of writing styles for different audiences, and improve writing by correcting errors, restricting, and rewriting.
- 3. Write essays and other works to include drafts, journals, and in-class writing.

Course Structure

In this course, students will write three major essays: Narrative essay, Example essay, and Rhetorical Analysis essay. Each essay corresponds to a different unit. For each unit, students will read three short stories and complete short responses and discussion posts based on their analyses.

Himdag Cultural Component

For the Narrative essay, students will write about one instance when they witnessed *T-So:son* ("Our Core") values (*T-Wohocudadag*—Our Beliefs, *T-Apedag*—Our Well-Being, *T-Pi:k Elida*—Our Deepest Respect, and *I-We:mta*—Working Together) operating in their lives. For Unit 1, they will read stories of magical realism (when the ordinary becomes extraordinary) and adopt that style into the Narrative essay.

Policies and Expectations

Incomplete Policy

Incomplete (I) grades are not awarded automatically. The student must request an "I" from the instructor who can choose to award an Incomplete only if all three of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The student must be in in compliance with the attendance policy.
- 2. The student must have unavoidable circumstance that would prohibit the student from completing the course.
- 3. The student must have completed over 75% of the course requirements with at least a "C" grade.

Incompletes are not a substitute for incomplete work due to frequent absences or poor academic performance. Incomplete grades that are not made up by the end of the ninth week of the following semester will be automatically changed to an F if the agreed upon work, as stipulated on the written form signed by the instructor and the student when the I grade is awarded, is not completed.

Instructor Withdrawals

Students who have missed four consecutive classes (or the equivalent) not submitted any assignments nor taken any quizzes by the 45th day census report, due on [date of 45th day found in Academic Calendar on TOCC website] are assumed NOT to be participating in the class and may be withdrawn at the faculty member's discretion. [faculty members should be clear in their withdraw policy, if you do not withdraw students please note in appropriate sections].

Student Withdrawals

Students may withdraw from class at any time during the first 2/3 of the semester without instructor permission and without incurring any grade penalty.
