Course Description

Survey of the history, causes, and attempts to prevent holocausts. Includes: Causes and legacies of the Nazi assault on humanity, history of hate in Europe, historical antecedents and preconditions, Third Reich and creation of the racial state, from isolation to the to the "Final Solution", aftermath (1945-), and the Holocaust and relevant events. Also includes history of genocidal policies toward indigenous peoples.

Student Learning Outcomes

After completion of the course students will be able to

- 1. Write a short quiz essay identifying and discussing major people, events and time periods. 2. Define and appropriately utilize historical terminology in answering quiz questions, presentations, and their written research paper.
- 3. Be able to apply basic historical methodologies and critical thought to current and historical events.

Course Structure

This course is **online asynchronous**, so we do not meet in person. And, except for periodic recorded lectures, and made available to you through a link to a Zoom or Loom, recording, communication about the course will be done through postings on the course site, and via email. So be sure to check your TOCC email at least once a day.

Students will be examined based on their comprehension of the readings, participation, and preparation for small group online discussions on particular topics, and application of themes / theory in their individual work for the course.

This is an online discussion-based class. Students are expected to fully engage in the critical analysis of the materials / reading online format through participation in the **Online Discussions**.

- 1- Students are required to post a response to a topic I will post for each Discussion.
- 2- Students will then read the posts of other students in the course and choose at least two posts to respond to, on two different days, in order interact with other students, and to move the discussion forward. This is an opportunity to also ask others for their input to questions you may have, as we can all learn from each other.
- 3 Links to a selection of **videos / interviews** will be posted for students to access online.
- 4 There will be a **Virtual Field Trip** (also recorded on Zoom with the link provided so it can be accessed later if necessary). Full details TBA. There will be a writing assignment for this field trip.

Course Learning Materials and Textbook Information

Students are expected be prepared to engage in critical analysis of the materials / reading in class online discussions and in their other work for the course.

DISCLAIMER: This syllabus is designed to evolve and change throughout the semester based on class progress and interests. You will be notified of any changes as they occur.

The course sessions are online and include readings, discussions and links to videos. Please note that some of the information and other materials may be disturbing to view or read about. some, which may be exhibited on line. Students will be examined based on their comprehension of the readings, online participation as demonstrated in their discussion posts related to particular topics, and application of themes / theory in their projects.

During this course students will learn how to identify the foundation and propagation of policies of eugenics, racial, cultural and religious selections, and Anti-Semitism and genocidal practices before, during and after the Nazi regime.

- 1. Correlate the cultures studied with specific ideologies and time periods in which they developed, were propagated and disseminated about, to, and within particular groups.
- 2. Identify the relationship of social and historical factors and xenophobia to the propagation of state policies.
- 3. Identify survival strategies of individuals and groups.
- 3. Define and employ theoretical methodologies used in the scholarly interpretation of historical events.

Holocaust: A History

It will take time to read the Holocaust textbook. Some of this will depend on how much information you already have about the Holocaust and the period, countries, cultures, and years, during which it occurred. Documentary and other films, plus audio recordings, will help fill in the blanks, and provide background to the period and the people who perpetrated the Final Solution, and the victims, and survivors, of the Holocaust. If you have specific questions, please let me know.

Our Crime Was Being Jewish

This is a collection of accounts by Holocaust survivors. In it they discuss their individual experiences in a few paragraphs or a couple of pages. I do not have a list of those I want you to read. I would just like you to randomly thumb through the book and read at least 5 of these each week. At the end of the course, I want you to revisit the information you gained from reading these accounts and write a Reflection essay. I suggest you keep a list of the ones you read and a short sentence or two about your reaction to each one. Then you will have what you need for the Reflection assignment.

Please note: I will create Discussions and attach points for each of them. Some of the Discussions may be divided into two parts, i.e., Discussion 3 part 1, Discussion 3 part 2.

I know there may be delays in getting textbooks. Be sure you get the correct one by Timothy Snyder's book On Tyranny – It is the Graphic Version. I sent out emails twice about the textbooks.

Week 3: Read *Holocaust*: Chapters 1 through 3; Begin Reading *On Tyranny* (go through the book as a first reading. You will be assigned the book again for a close reading later in the semester).

Go to the Module titled Interviews. Listen to the Interviews which were conducted by TOCC student Dylon Lott, for the TOCC Radio program. Listen to all of them but pay particular attention to Mrs. Wanda Wolosky's interviews. She is the child survivor of the Warsaw Ghetto. This was an unlikely survival, prompted by a loaf of bread (more on that later).

1. Hitler and the Nazis - this has clips of the Warsaw Ghetto where Mrs. Wanda Wolosky lived

with her Mother. Mrs. Wolosky smuggled food into the Ghetto by going through the sewage

tunnels when she was a 5 year old child. Watch before or after you listen to the TOCC Radio Interviews.

- 2. The Auschwitz Museum
- 3. Playing for Time (drama based on a true account of a survivor)
- 4. The Forgotten Genocide (about the Romany aka Gypsies it has English subtitles)
- 5. The Rape of Europa (about Nazi looting of European art and sculpture)
- 6. The Invisibles (this has English subtitles)
- 7. Woman in Gold (drama of a descendant's attempt to get her Aunt's portrait which had been

stolen by the Nazis and was in the Austrian Museum in Vienna.
